Fareham hospital progress dogged by NHS red tape

A WIDER range of services could be on the cards at Fareham Community Hospital.

Medical bosses say the £24m recently opened building is under-used and hindered by NHS red tape.

For example, 5 separate NHS organisations must be consulted before any action can be taken.

The situation was revealed at a well-attended Friends of the Hospital annual meeting in July.

Dr Alan McFarlane (Brook Lane Surgery) and the senior development officer for Fareham & Gosport Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG), Sarah Tiller, highlighted some of the current constraints inhibiting full use.

The CCG contracts services from other NHS agencies, including the QA and Southampton General Hospitals, from 8am to 8pm five days a week.

Fareham's hospital is open only until 5.30pm daily as receptionists and cleaners are employed by another NHS trust.

The CCG plans full use of the hospital by contracting out more outpatient clinics and other services.

In the not too distant future it wants a minor injuries unit and other diagnostic facilities providing a wider range of services closer to the community.

It is also planned to provide further services at the hospital and a day care centre for dementia sufferers.

Councillor Brian Bayford, Fareham Council's representative on the CCG board, said: "If a resident has an outpatient appointment (for other than



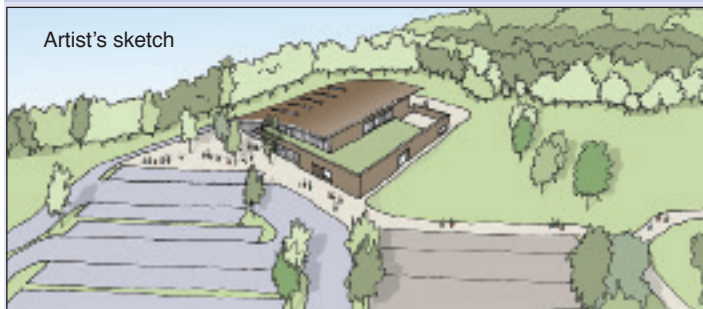
MSK needs) at the hospital and then requires a MRI scan, in many cases this requires a separate visit to QA.

"Another major problem at the hospital is that any action requires 5 separate NHS organisations to be consulted, so no one NHS agency or person is in overall control."

Early in September, the CCG organised a 'workshop' at the hospital with interested persons and organisations to identify the problems and to work toward the fullest use of this facility.

£7m Western Wards leisure centre to open in 2016



PLANS for a Western Wards leisure complex are well under way and it's expected to open in July 2016

A swimming pool and fitness suite are included in the centre which will cost £7m.

Conservative-led Fareham Borough Council has set aside funds and outline planning consent for building it on the old Coldeast Hospital site in Sarisbury is in place.

Councillor Seán Woodward stated: "Provision of a swimming pool for the Western Wards has been a high priority of mine for many years and I'm pleased there is such strong public support for this project."

Balfour Beatty, one of the country's leading construction companies, won the contract to design and build the centre and RTP Leisure has been appointed as leisure consultant.

Next step will be a public consultation on the design and access before a detailed application is submitted. It will be sited next to Barnes Lane opposite Holly Hill Woodland Park and near Sarisbury Infant School.

"I am so pleased to be able to thank the people of Sarisbury Ward, including Sarisbury, Swanwick, Burridge, Lower Swanwick and Whiteley, for placing their trust in me and re-electing me for an eighth 4-year term."

Councillor Woodward, who had a majority of 1,290, has now represented the ward for 28 years.

Housing plan special meeting

There will be a special Community Action Team meeting at Sarisbury Community Centre at 7pm on Friday, November 7.

This will be specifically for residents of Swanwick and Lower Swanwick to discuss the forthcoming planning appeal against the Council's decision to refuse planning permission to build 37 houses adjoining the Navigator public house at Lower Swanwick, which will be heard at Ferneham Hall, Fareham on December 9.

Yellow lines solution

Residents of Coldeast Close have complained about badly parked cars during school starting and finishing times.

Councillors Seán Woodward and David Swanbrow met residents in July to discuss the problems and possible solutions.

Parents arrive long before the children leave school and park anywhere they can.

But many have been causing safety concerns in Coldeast Close by parking on corners and even in the middle of the road at the end of the green.

Fareham Borough Council has now proposed waiting restrictions (yellow lines) at the most dangerous places.

Work will begin soon provided that there are no serious concerns following consultation with residents.

If further problems arise, additional action may be considered.

Romantic wedding setting in the manor re-born



FANCY a prestigious mansion for your wedding venue? Then look no further than the one pictured above.

Coldeast Mansion, on the site of the former hos-

pital, is being converted to create 36 apartments for hire and a wedding venue.

So you might well be able to accommodate all your guests under one roof.

It's expected to be open within a year when the apartments can be hired for up to 12 months and, with the grounds restored, it's likely to prove popular.

Developer Nick Sutton is spending £2m restoring the mansion, once the home of

19th century benefactor Claude Montefiore. It eventually housed patients with learning difficulties and has been derelict since the NHS

closed it in 1990.

Councillor Seán Woodward, pictured with Nick Sutton, said: "I had the mansion locally listed 25 years ago, but it wasn't a statutory designation.

"I'm delighted it's still standing and it will be fantastic to have such a high quality venue on the site and to have public access again to a historic local building."



Decision nears on Whiteley bus gate permanent opening

HAMPSHIRE'S transport chief will decide on November 4 whether the bus gate linking Botley Road, Swanwick to Yew Tree Drive, Whiteley should stay open to all traffic except heavy goods vehicles.

County Councillor Seán Woodward, Executive Member for Economy, Transport and Environment, said a survey showed most local residents wanted it to stay open.

If he decides 'Yes', then Fareham Borough Council will have the final say on whether to grant planning consent.

His decision may rest on a recent successful bid by Solent Local Enterprise Partnership for £14m of government funding to speed up the North Whiteley development, mainly to open a northern access to Whiteley within 3 years.

This would mean completing Bluebell Way to access Botley Road, which would also help early construction of a new primary school and continue Whiteley Way to the secondary school

Traffic flow predictions based on future development show that keeping the Yew Tree Drive link and opening Bluebell Way would reduce traffic through Burridge.

Traffic calming measures will be needed on Swanwick Lane, which could be paid for from the government funding.

Lottery grant enhances brickworks museum



BURSLEDON Brickworks has made good use of the grant it received from Heritage Lottery Fund.

The museum is a popular attraction but the reopening on August 17 showed by how much it had benefited from the grant and how hard the volunteers had worked.

Councillor David Swanbrow said: "It is now open more often and its First World War exhibit was superb."

To mark the reopening a special brickworks cake was made by Gwendoline's Traditional Cakes.

Mark acts to tackle crisis at the Queen Alexandra



When we go to hospital in an emergency, we expect to be seen quickly and then either admitted for further treatment or sent home.

The Government has set a target to make sure this happens, unfortunately the Queen Alexandra has consistently missed this target which is bad news for all of us.

In September I called a summit of local

health chiefs in Westminster to hear their plans to hit the target.

They are taking sensible steps to tackle this.

With the help of £4m of taxpayers’ money, they will open up more beds over the winter, set up an urgent care centre to prioritise treatment and improve discharge procedures.

But they also made a plea for people to think whether they would be better to see their GP, visit the chemist or minor injuries unit.

Health chiefs will report back on their progress in December.

Air traffic boss ‘blown away’ by Rainbow work



When National Air Traffic Services (NATS), Fareham’s biggest employer, asked me to nominate a local charity for a £500 donation, I didn’t hesitate and suggested the Rainbow Centre, which is based at Cams Alders.

But rather than simply post the cheque, I asked NATS boss, Richard Deakin, to present it to the centre’s director, Lara Bull.

It was a good way for Richard to see for himself why this is such a good cause. The centre, which gets next to no taxpayers’ money to fund its work, helps children with cerebral palsy

and adults who have had a stroke or who have Parkinsons or MS.

They do excellent work for children who had written off ever walking again. I know Richard was blown away by the centre’s work.

Surgery waiting times

Many residents are worried about GPs waiting times and I understand their concerns.

To see the problem from the GPs’ perspective, I visited surgeries in Whiteley, Titchfield and Locks Heath to talk to GPs, practice staff and nurses.

I will be at the Brook Lane surgery soon. Clearly, we don’t have enough GPs for the local population and we have one of the worst ratios of GPs to patients in the country.

Once I have completed my visits, I will take up this issue with local health chiefs.

Sea Sunday service

While there have been many events to mark the centenary of the First World War, I attended this year’s Sea Sunday Service at Warsash marked the 70th anniversary of the D-Day landings of commandos who embarked for Normandy from Warsash.
