Swimming gold medallist Adam Peaty opens showpiece leisure centre

Rio Olympics hero admits: 'I was scared of water

as a child'

OLYMPIC swimming hero Adam Peaty opened the £9m state-of-the-art Holly Hill Leisure Centre and admitted:

"Although it might be hard to believe, I was actually scared of water when I was younger."

Adam, who triumphed at the Rio Olympics by winning Team GB's first gold medal in the 100m breaststroke breaking his world record set the day before, was acutely afraid of being bathed as a young boy.

The 21-year-old super star was full of praise for the showpiece centre in Sarisbury which boasts a 25-me- It's not often you get a swimming lesson from an Olympic champion. tre pool with 6 lanes and a learner pool, gym, spinning room and dance centre.

In a landmark day for the Western Wards, he told guests: "I know how important it is that we educate more people about the health and safety benefits of swimming, especially those who live in coastal areas such as Fareham.

"I think the pool here at Holly Hill Leisure Centre will go a long way in helping to do that.

"It's also at local pools like these where future athletes are discovered and, for me, it's very exciting to think that could happen here at Holly Hill."

A plague was unveiled at the centre by Adam and the Mayor of Fareham, Councillor Connie Hockley.

Fareham Council Leader Seán Woodward said: "This is the

delivery of my pledge. made over 25 years ago, and I am so grateful to all





those who made it possible.

"It is the culmination of a project which began after our suggestion, strongly supported by residents, that we needed

another swimming pool in the Borough."

Over 2,000 people have signed up for membership and the centre is open to all.

Fareham's Conservative-run Council has also provided new sports pitches near the leisure centre, worked with volunteers to improve the woodland and lake and has also agreed a £130,000 multi-use games area which will be provided in the new year.

Rookery Avenue application

A planning application (P/16/1088/ OA) has been submitted by Foreman Homes to the Borough Council for 22 houses to the south and east of Rookery Avenue, Swanwick.

It adjoins a Site of Importance for Nature Conservation (SINC) and is not allocated for development.

Previous attempts to develop there have failed.

Application documents claim it would bring forward a short extension of Rookery Avenue; however, it would not be sufficient to allow completion of the missing link to connect Rookery Avenue, Swanwick to Rookery Avenue, Whiteley.

Comments will be accepted by the Council up to the day it is decided, probably by Christmas.

More North of Whiteley delays push new school opening back to September 2019

CORNERSTONE

NORTH OF WHITELEY development has been delayed by approximately another six months and is now expected to start in May 2017.

The site for Cornerstone Primary School will not

be available to the County Council to begin work on building the new school until September 2017 which allows the developers to build the road to the school and provide the services required to the boundary of the site.

This means that the school will not be moved and open for the September 2018 intake as more than 12 months is needed to build it.

The County Council is now proposing to have the school built for the start of the September 2019 academic year.

The reason for delaying the opening for 12 months is that it makes things much easier to manage in terms of the admission number for the school which will not have to move during an academic year.

Forecast pupil numbers for the area show that there will be enough places available for any new pupils arising from the development prior to the opening of the relocated school.

County Councillor Seán Woodward said: "It is really galling that there is yet another delay to the North of Whiteley development when there is such important infrastructure relying on it, including new roads and schools.

"This is despite planning consent having been granted and the school designs having been well supported by the public.

"It is a good thing that the temporary school is in fantastic buildings and well able to cope with increased demand on its existing site."

New project relives past at Bursledon Brickworks

Expect a fine if you park like this

IT'S A COMMON sight across the Borough - vehicles illegally parked on verges and pavements.

An annoyed resident snapped the one pictured, which was on a bend and obstructing the footpath, forcing pedestrians into the road.

Councillor Jon Butts said: "Drivers parking illegally causing nuisance for pedestrians and residents near Whiteley Primary School and

local shopping centre are the subject of increased reporting for enforcement." Police can issue a summons for obstructing the pavement and Fareham Council can issue a fixed penalty for obstructing a dropped kerb.

YOU can step back over 100 years at Bursledon Brickworks, Lower Swanwick to see how workers lived then.

Thanks to the Headley Trust, the Friends of Burs ledon Brickworks have

created 4 rooms based on the cottages built for the workers in 1900.

They contrast the way the men and their families lived in 1900 and the 1970s which was when the cottages were sold.

The project was opened by Fareham Council Leader Seán Woodward who "The brickworks is a great local ame-

nity which is now firmly on the national map as a must-see museum for the built environment.

"I encourage everyone to go and have a look at this gem right on our doorstep."
