# Emergency use plan being drawn up for Whiteley bus link route

A PLAN is being put together for the use of the Yew Tree Drive/Botley Road bus link (pictured) in emergencies.

Apart from the use by emergency vehicles, the link is available to all traffic when the police use their powers under the road traffic act to instantly override the traffic regulation order.

This could be done in cases where there are problems either side of the link necessitating its opening to all vehicles,

such as problems at the M27 junction 9 or indeed elsewhere in Whiteley, Burridge, Swanwick or Park Gate.

It is important to work out what signage will be used to warn motorists of the problem and that the link is available.



Possibilities include variable message signing or simple signage which can be manually deployed at very short notice.

A draft plan has been completed which the police have to approve before more detailed consultation.

Once the plan has been agreed with the police, the County Council will consult all interested parties before the plan's adoption.



INITIAL proposals for the longawaited play area in the new Persimmon development off Dickens Drive are now being priced up ready for implementation.

Realistically, the play equipment (pictured) should be completed by Persimmon ready for summer 2009.

The cost is about £100,000, with £50,000 being contributed from the proceeds of the land that was sold to build the doctors' surgery on Yew Tree Drive and Persimmon contributing the other £50,000.

Councillor Seán Woodward said the reason for a joint project was to provide a much better facility than would otherwise be provided by the level of development in the Persimmon building scheme.

The plans as currently envisaged provide play areas for younger and older children, plus a kickabout area with a bas-
