Just a 1p a day rise as Tories set austerity-defying budget

CONSERVATIVES have agreed yet another austerity-defying budget for Fareham.

Despite losing its entire Revenue Support Grant from government, the Borough share of council tax will rise by just 1p a day for the average home.

The Council spends £46m delivering services, but the amount raised in council tax accounts for only 14% of that sum, so we have to raise the rest by investing YOUR money wisely.

For example, over £26m has been invested in the last 3 years in commercial property, mainly in Fareham Borough, producing an income of nearly £2m a year.

Without this income your council tax would have to be increased by nearly 30%.

The resulting budget sees the Council's services remain intact and a district council tax which remains almost the lowest in the country.

Car parking charges are frozen for the 7th year and continue to apply only in the town centre, and free in the evenings and Sundays in the long-stay car parks.

Council Leader Seán Woodward said: "Times are incredibly hard in the public sector, but we have been able to preserve all the services which our residents value

while respecting that many, particularly those on fixed incomes, would find even modest increases in our charges difficult to bear."

Council will find you a plot to self-build your dream home

EVER dreamt of building your own home?

Fareham Council has started working towards that goal with The Right to Build Task Force.

It aims to include a range of custom and self-build housing plots at Welborne Garden Village and elsewhere in the Borough on any developments of 100 homes and above.

Since its launch last year, the Task Force has been working with councils, landowners and others to bring forward custom, self-build and community-led housing opportunities, with an emphasis on scale and



housing affordability. It can offer subsidised support for councils and community groups to enable them to meet the demand for selfbuild space.

One of the Task Force's key objectives is to provide more affordable homes for those in housing need and work with councils to help deliver these.

Council Leader Seán Woodward, councillors and officers met the Right to Build Task Force recently with Richard Bacon MP, ambassador of the Task Force and Mario Wolf, Task Force director.

Richard Bacon said: "It was a

pleasure to meet Fareham Borough Council to discuss self-building opportunities in Fareham.

"Developments such as Welborne offer huge scope for bringing forward a range of well-designed housing options and are, therefore, a logical choice to help meet local demand for people who want to build their own homes."

Residents who are interested in building their own homes in the Fareham area and Welborne can sign up to the Council's register at http://www.fareham.gov.uk/planning/local_plan/selfbuild.aspx

This will help them to find a suitable plot of land.

Only those that have lived or worked in the Borough for at least two years are eligible.



Crossing worries

Parents have contacted us about the safety of crossing Barnes Lane with their young children to access Sarisbury Infant School and Woodlands Pre-school.

We have advised them to park in Holly Hill Leisure Centre car park so they won't need to cross Barnes

Officers will investigate putting semi-formal paths across the grass to enable easier walking from the car park to the schools.

We have also asked for temporary flashing 30mph signs to be erected on Barnes Lane near the PUFFIN crossing.

Medical loan centre

After years of chasing we are advised that the lease for the Red Cross medical loan store at Fareham Community Hospital is ready for signing which means that. albeit years late, the store should be opened this spring.

Cemetery extension

A £300,000 extension to Holly Hill Cemetery has been approved which will provide additional grave space for another 30 years.

Space for cremated remains will also be included. This has been agreed as the very popular cemetery is now almost full, meaning that people cannot be buried conveniently near to their loved ones.

Dementia support group

A memory support group for people living with dementia and their carers meets every Monday from 10.30 to 3pm at Fareham Community Hospi-

This is an informal group and people may come every week or just drop in when they want to.

Refreshments are provided by the volunteers of the Friends of the Hospital.

A dementia advisor is available for appointments and the friends are there to chat and help.

Temporary library closure

No healthcare provision for extra 3,500 Whiteley homes



A VITAL piece of infrastructure is missing from plans passed by Winchester City Council for 3,500 homes north of Whiteley.

The service is being implemented by NHS

doctors and managers, and currently takes 200-300 calls a day.

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School children's lives at risk as **PUFFIN** crossing bid is ruled out

CHILDREN'S lives are in danger crossing roads around Brookfield School.

It has raised parents' fears and calls for a crossing after several accidents and near misses.

Large numbers of children use the roads and have to contend with narrow pavements on parts of Brook Lane, particularly at Lockswood Road roundabout.

County Councillor Seán Woodward had several traffic counts carried out over the last decade to try to get a controlled

crossing as close to the roundabout as possible.

He said all these counts showed more than enough vehicles to justify the crossing, but nowhere near enough

The latest count last September proved the criteria for a PUFFIN crossing were met where most pedestrians cross on Brook Lane, immediately north of the roundabout.

However, because of the number of driveways on the east side of Brook Lane and other technical complications, it is impossible to install a PUFFIN crossing

Councillor Woodward said: "It is really disappointing, having been pursuing this matter for a decade, that as soon as the criteria for a controlled crossing are met the feasibility study shows that it cannot be sited where most people cross.

"I met the headmistress and her team at Brookfield School and have asked the County Council to enhance the visibility of the point at which most people cross as well as the remainder of Brook Lane near the school with luminous bollards, carriageway markings etc."

Developers try their luck despite 'no new sites' ruling

NO NEW housing sites have been allocated in the new Fareham Draft Local Plan for Sarisbury Ward.

The new Plan, produced in 2017, sets out where development should and should not go.

Nevertheless, developers have submitted applications to build in countryside, none of which is proposed for development:

Sopwith Way, Swanwick: 42 houses - Refused. 60 Swanwick Lane, Swanwick: 70 houses. Awaiting

17 and 77 Burridge Road, Burridge: 2 houses. Both Refused by Planning Committee

Rookery Avenue, Swanwick: 22 houses. Refused by Planning Committee and Refused at appeal. Duplicate application withdrawn.

Barnes Lane, Sarisbury: 75-bed care home. Refused.

Councillor Seán Woodward said: "There are many applications being submitted right across Fareham in areas which are not allocated for development either in the existing Local Plan or the new draft Local Plan.

"The Committee must also take into account that an appeal inspector ignored ministerial guidance that our existing Local Plan numbers should hold sway while the new Local Plan was going through its statutory processes, meaning that Fareham temporarily does not have a full 5-year land supply for new housing.

"Until that gap is filled the balance of consideration is further tilted in favour of the developers."

Residents are encouraged to have their say on these applications right up to the date of whichever Planning Committee considers them.
